Reviving the Ring: A New Chapter for Petz Conformation By: Dahlia

Since the Petz Kennel Club (PKC) closed in 2022, many cherished show teams have been waiting patiently for their moment in the spotlight to return. Many longtime breeders and handlers missed the thrill of the ring, the challenge of large competitions and realistic judging, and the joy of earning a well-deserved title. That longing recently sparked a revival — a fresh take on Petz conformation that nods to the PKC's legacy while making space for new ideas and fresh interpretation.

When Thor started the Petz Show Club, her dream was simple but powerful: to create a friendly, easy-to-use platform where anyone could participate in petz shows from their phone or computer.

While petz from PKC-style breedfiles eventually, and sometimes reluctantly, returned to the pose show ring, their made-for-show hexed breedfiles sometimes gave unfair advantages or left judges unsure of how to evaluate entries.

In April 2025, I launched a few trial conformation shows for purebred, (mostly) to standard catz and dogz, quickly igniting excitement across the Petz Show Club community and beyond. What began as a trial run rapidly grew into thriving events, with the latest shows boasting over 250 entries each — proof that the spirit of conformation showing is very much alive and thriving.

By May, it was clear this revival was ready to take off. We welcomed three new team members — Shade as a conformation judge, Anthracite as a genetics and standards consultant, and Kristina as a registrar. Several other members of the community also regularly volunteer their time for graphics development, standards questions, and overall support. Together, we help each other build our show teams and provide lots of encouragement every step of the way.

So what exactly is Petz Conformation — and how is it different from the traditional pose shows most of us are used to?

In traditional pose shows, petz of all shapes, sizes, colors, and pedigrees compete against each other based on the quality of their pose. Judges are looking for perfect alignment, high breathing points, straight faces, and curved tails. Mixed breed or purebred doesn't matter, and neither does the realism of the pet's colors or shape.

Conformation shows raise the bar. Judges still consider pose quality — but with the added challenge of a few new requirements. The petz must be purebred (or look purebred), and they must meet a breed standard. Colors and markings matter! Unrealistic colors and markings can result in a pet being faulted or disqualified. Fortunately, the PKC generously allows the public to use the breed standards they developed over more than 20 years of dedication and research.

Not only is the judging different, but the points system is too.

In standard pose shows, "Everybody Wins" formats are the most common, with each pet generally walking away with 1–5 points toward their show title. These shows are usually small — less than 20 entries, sometimes only five — so each pet will eventually title with enough patience, even those with less-than-stellar poses. A multitude of titles exist for different point levels, with the most common title for retiring being Supreme Grand Champion at 30 points.

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Reviving the Ring (continued)

In conformation shows, petz first compete in the breed ring, where they are judged against their breed standard and by their poses compared to other competitors of the same breed. Each breed might see five, ten, or even dozens of entries, all vying for Best of Breed and Best of Opposite Sex — each worth two points.

In larger classes (those with more than ten entries), Awards of Merit may also be given, each worth one point. For breeds with only one entry, a PICK placement is awarded, though it carries no point value. In smaller classes (fewer than four entries), an Honorable Mention may be awarded instead, worth one point. All others go home empty-handed.

Once breed judging concludes, petz awarded Best of Breed, PICK, or Honorable Mention advance to the Group Ring. Here, they compete within their respective groups <u>(found here)</u> for four placements: Group 1, Group 2, Group 3, and Group 4. These group titles are primarily for bragging rights and hold no point value — but they're an exciting step toward the final round.

The top winner from each group (Group 1) moves on to the Winners Circle — the moment we all wait for. Here, the very best from each group competes for the coveted title of Best in Show, worth five points. Following that are Best Winner and Reserve Winner (four points each), and Winner 1 through Winner 4 (three points each).

After earning ten points, a pet is officially recognized as a conformation champion!

So you might be asking: what's the draw?

It does sound difficult — and for many, that's exactly the point. There's something uniquely rewarding about seeing your pet rise to the top of a crowded breed ring, or take home Best in Show from an event with hundreds of entries. That challenge adds weight and meaning to every title earned.

For others, it's about realism. Many of us dreamed of showing dogs or cats in real life — but for a variety of reasons, that didn't happen. Or maybe it did, but owning every breed we admire just isn't feasible. Conformation shows offer a way to live that dream in a realistic and thoughtfully structured format.

Personally, I appreciate the slower pace of titling. It gives me time to pursue other goals, like obedience and aptitude titles, Petz Citizen, or the many sport titles offered through Duke's Group.

It also lets me slow down and really enjoy each pet — especially beautifully crafted hexies.

There's something deeply satisfying about building a line of SGCh petz. The same is true maybe even more so — with conformation lines. Watching them grow, show, and succeed is an experience worth savoring.

Over the past two decades, the Petz community has hexed hundreds of breeds the base game never included. Today, most breeds have a range of available breedfiles to suit every taste — from petzy styles to detailed, hyper-realistic versions. These creations are a labor of love, and they deserve to be celebrated.

Member Spotlight: Kristina @ Entwined Love



Tell us a little about yourself

I'm an almost forty-year-old-woman, married, and childfree. We've got a cat. We had more, but, you know. Old age gets them too young.

How long have you been playing petz?

I was gifted Petz 3 on Christmas 1999. I was probably playing a demo of Petz II before that, I don't remember. I was a few weeks shy of my 14th birthday. I haven't been playing constantly and have been in-and-out of the community. I rediscovered/rejoined the community in the autumn of last year after a 15-year "hiatus."

Do you have any special petz interests?

I love pose showing. There's something about a pet standing all pretty and proud. Getting a title and ribbons and trophies to show off on my personal spreadsheet (and one day my site) is good fun too.

Do you have a favorite pet?

My favorite is probably my first, adopted from the AC on December 25, 1999. His name is Love and he's a Maine Coon. He has a different show name than all of my other petz, his starts with "Entwined Love," my user name. I don't remember which came first, my user name or his show name! All of his descendants use the prefix "Entwined Love" instead of my usual "Tangle."

What's something new you've learned recently?

The whicker basket can be eaten! Also, that you can add addballz in PWS. I haven't tried it yet, but that might be what starts a new era in my hexing.

What's your favorite petzy thing you've created?

I don't know. I'm quite fond of a few of my hexpainted petz and I like my website, but nothing jumps out as my best-thing-ever.

How many PSC petz do you have?

Current count is 186. 110 of them have reached SGCh and retired. I used to try to keep only a handful active, but then Conformation shows started and I wanted to enter all of my petz. (I have not registered all of my pets. Yet.)

What would you tell a nonmember about PSC to encourage them to join?

If you enjoy showing, you'll like PSC. If you did PKC and liked conformation shows, you'll like PSC. If you didn't do PKC but wanted to, you'll like PSC. Come join us. We're fun. Faster paced than forum shows. We don't have to add up our own points or keep records (unless you want to). The bot does it for us! With a simple command, I can see every show my pet has entered and what their placements were. So easy, so tidy. It's great!

What is your favorite type of show to host?

I joined as a judge in December in anticipation of Dalmatian month and hosted a few Dali-only shows, but there wasn't as much activity as the Mutt and Great Danes months prior, so I stopped. I've only judged pose shows.

What is your favorite type of show to enter?

Everybody Wins pose shows. Hands down. I am enjoying the Conformation shows, but I like the feeling of seeing my pets' points go up after every show.

Petz Spotlight: Powder
